Water - the Source of Life Prevent Dehydration

Especially with the warmer weather coming, keeping your greyhound well hydrated is becoming more important. One of the things that is easy to overlook is maintaining an adequate amount of water for your dog. Water composes approximately 60% of the standard dog's body weight. In the exceptionally lean animals (such as greyhounds), the ratio can be as high as 70%.

During the course of a day, without any extra fluid loss from exercise, diarrhea, vomiting, etc., the dog requires 88 to 132 ml per pound. This means that a typical 66 pound greyhound would require between 1200 and 1800 ml of water (approximately 1 quart). This does not include any extra losses from exercise-induced panting that could add several hundred ml. extra.

With a greyhound that is kenneled without water for a typical ten hour day of owners being at work, this means that they have to go through feast and famine cycles with their water metabolism. When they are let out, they not only need to drink nearly a quart of water, but they also need to get their food requirement. But their stomach is only so big.

When the greyhound is in the pen prior to racing, they are restricted from drinking water and frequently lose two to three pounds. They are only in these pens for four hours, so you can imagine what sort of weight loss from dehydration might be occurring over a ten hour period.

Some ways to tell if your greyhound is dehydrated, and by how much, are as follows:

Percent Dehydrations Clinical Signs
5 to 6 Slight loss of elasticity to skin. When skin is pulled up, returns slightly less quickly to normal.
6 to 8 Definite delay in skin to returning to normal, gums dry and tacky feeling.
10 to 12 When skin pulled up, stays up. Possible signs of shock (rapid, weak pulse).
12 to 15 Death is imminent.

Keeping water available at all times is essential. The best way to monitor your pet's hydration status is by feeling their gums and skin elasticity each day so you can be the first line of defense against dehydration.

Let others know when they've invaded your territory.

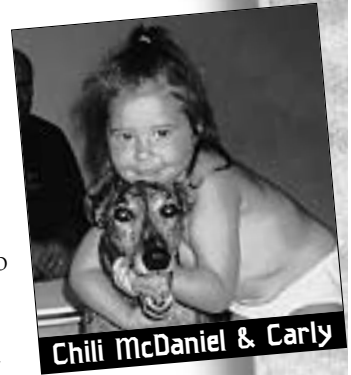
Take naps and stretch before rising.

Run, romp and play daily.

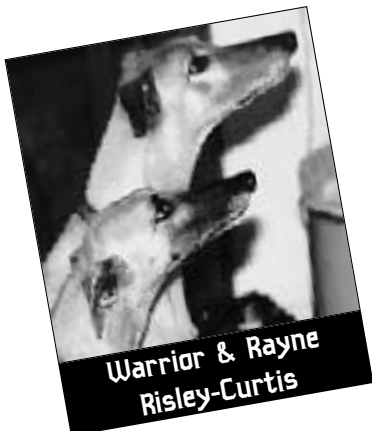
Eat with gusto and enthusiasm.

Summer is Approaching

We've all been warned about the heat in the summer and our dog's comfort, but we need to be very careful with our canine friends while driving around town. On an average 85 degree day (average for May, maybe!) the temperature inside your car with the windows partially open will reach **102 degrees in 10 minutes**. In **30 minutes** it could reach up to **120 degrees**. When it's hot outside, most dogs, and greyhounds especially, would prefer to be inside with the air conditioner blowing or lounging in front of a fan. **Remember, the best prevention for heat exhaustion is to leave your pet in a safe, cool home.**

Also, "If you can't walk on the sidewalk in your bare feet, neither can your greyhound!" Please be careful, their pads are so delicate.

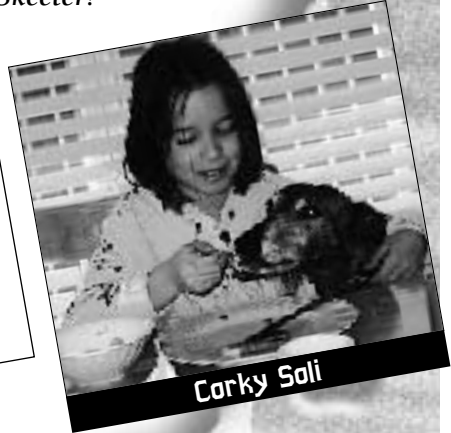
Skeeter Did It!

Walt and Peggy Ringhoff adopted Skeeter (race name I Be Happnin Dude) in May, 1994. He is a red brindle male and is now seven years old. Walt and Peggy have been working with Skeeter in Obedience Trials, and in an A.K.C. dog show on March 21st of this year at Westworld, Skeeter qualified for his **A.K.C. Companion Dog Title in Obedience Training**. To get this award a dog must get a qualifying score of at least 170 out of a possible 200 points on three separate occasions under three different judges. Skeeter's average score was 180. He qualified in five shows.

The Ringhoff's feel that positive reinforcement and short training sessions are the key to working with greyhounds. "Hounds get bored easily, lots of praise and treats help" the Ringhoff's wrote. 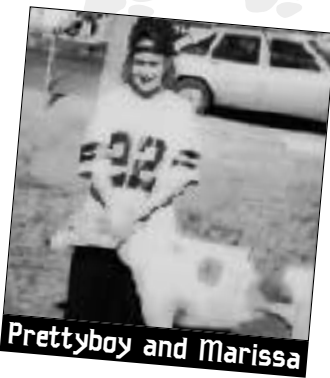
